Part A

Part B

What evidence from the poem **best** supports the answer in part A?

- "bitten by the sun / turned orange or crimson."
- "The leaves cling and grow paler, / swing and grow paler"
- "over the swirling waters of the river / as if loath to let go,"
- "oblivious to winter. / the last to let go and fall"

- ▶ Multiple Choice
 - ▶ Single Select (MC-K)
 - ▶ Multiple Select (MC-MS)
 - ▶ Multiple-Part (MC-MP)
- ▶ Constructed Response (CR)
- ▶ Technology-enhanced (TE)
- ▶ Performance Tasks

The Test Creation Process

- ▶ Initial Creation
 - ▶ Item Writer creates item set
 - ▶ Any sourced information needs to be cited
 - ▶ Appropriate, but also protective
 - ▶ Be wary of item “enemies”
- ▶ Initial Review(s)
 - ▶ First line of defense
 - ▶ Looking for things like sensibility of item, enemies, formatting, etc.
 - ▶ CETE had two sets
 - ▶ 2nd GRA and Content Lead
 - ▶ ELM has Content Lead review

The Test Creation Process

- ▶ Editing Team Review
 - ▶ Much of the review of items happens here
 - ▶ More format review
 - ▶ Bias & Sensitivity Review
- ▶ Back to Content
 - ▶ Content reconciles the changes Editing has made
 - ▶ Accept/reject changes
- ▶ Entry and Final Review
 - ▶ Items entered into delivery engine
 - ▶ Final review

The Test Creation Process

- ▶ Item Pilot & Performance Review
 - ▶ Items are placed in test alongside existing items in pool
 - ▶ Placed within test forms and are administered to students
- ▶ Three Fates at the End of the Road
 - ▶ Item performs well and is permanently added to the item pool
 - ▶ Item has questionable performance, and is further reviewed
 - ▶ The process repeats itself in this fate
 - ▶ Item has poor performance, is deemed irreparable, and is scrapped
- ▶ This is a constantly ongoing process for testing operations

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General Guidelines

- ▶ Choose the most appropriate type of item for the task you want test-takers to complete
- ▶ For non-literary content in items, be sure to cite the source
 - ▶ Even if it is common and accepted knowledge
- ▶ Include items of all difficulty levels
 - ▶ Content of items should drive difficulty of items
- ▶ Use the common name of items, not the brand name
- ▶ Avoid the use of the holidays in test questions
 - ▶ Arbor Day and Groundhog Day were the exceptions at CETE

Guidelines for Item Stems

- ▶ Stems should be complete questions
- ▶ Avoid the use of negatives in stems
- ▶ Avoid questions and prompts that evoke opinion over objectiveness

Guidelines for Answer Choices

- ▶ Only one correct answer choice for multiple choice – single select items
- ▶ At least two correct answer choices for multiple choice – multiple select items
 - ▶ MS items should have at least 5 alternatives, but no more than nine
 - ▶ No more than half of the answer choices should be correct answers
- ▶ Test questions should not be answerable without reading a stimulus
- ▶ Answer choices should ideally be similar in length
- ▶ Keep answer choice options simple and distinct
- ▶ Don't use obvious right/wrong options

Guideline for Answer Choices

- ▶ Logical ordering of answer choices is ideal
- ▶ Balance correct answer choices
- ▶ Mimic common errors test-takers would make
- ▶ Avoid
 - ▶ All/None of the above, I don't know, etc. as options
 - ▶ "Clueing" and "Enemies"
 - ▶ Absolutes
